SESSION MINI-MINUTES

Quite a few famous persons in our history were born in April. I chose one who I think was most instrumental in helping to form this Republic of ours. He was born April 13, 1743 and died on July 4, 1826. (What founding father wouldn't want to pass from this physical life into the next on July 4th?) He was a philosopher, educator, naturalist, politician, scientist, architect, inventor, pioneer in scientific farming, musician, and writer. In addition, he was

the foremost spokesman for democracy of his day. (Well now the Clerk doesn't feel so bad about all she has to do! I can only imagine how busy he was, and no computer to keep track of everything!) And you will remember that he was the person credited with writing The Declaration of Independence. I am sure you have guessed by now that you have been reading about our third president, Thomas Jefferson. He had a very classical education including Latin, Greek and Latin classics, history, literature, geography, and natural sciences. He attended the College of William and Mary in Williamsburg, Virginia. From there he became a lawyer, member of the Virginia House of Burgess, a Continental Congress Delegate, the Governor of Virginia, Minister of France, Secretary of State, Vice-President, and President of the United States. During this time, he married and had a son and five daughters (I know that his wife and servants helped raise the children but I hope their father had some time to spend with them). At age 65 he returned to his beloved mountaintop estate, Monticello, where he devoted himself to repairing and rebuilding his estate, designing houses for his friends, writing to friends like John Adams, and reading. Upon his death he left detailed instructions for his burial in a graveyard on his estate. After reading about Jefferson for this abbreviated tribute, I have to say that Jefferson and many men of his era were indeed the right people for the right time. Let's hope that we continue to raise men and women who are up for the challenges of their times.

Speaking of people who rise to the challenge of their times...Our **financials** are showing income of \$57,986.51 and expenses of \$41,987.72. **Member Care** scheduled an early spring membership class. On Easter Sunday we will be welcoming Michelle Cox and Michelle Houston as new members. The purpose of Member Care (a new department) is to oversee programs designed to welcome guests and to assimilate new members and retain existing members by providing fellowship opportunities, and participate in publicizing the activities of the church. **Personnel** met and each person on the committee will be a liaison with a member of our staff. When we meet in June we will be deciding how we will proceed with evaluations. **Finance** announced that the church is purchasing a 100% cedar wood playset, 2 brown convertible benches, and a border for the mulch to go in the play area north of the church. Thanks to **Maintaining** the leak in the women's restroom has been corrected. They are also getting equipment tuned up for outside work. **Nurturing** is encouraging all of us to attend the Tenebrae Service with Communion on Maundy Thursday in the sanctuary at 7pm. **Mission and Outreach** suggests anyone interested in the

"Guns to Gardens" event to view the Youtube video *Behind the Bullet*. We continue to support Kic-it, the organization helping homeless youth. This group will soon be going into schools and helping kids prepare for life after school. They also want to help them stay in school until graduation. Last but not least, Session discussed the document "Changes to the Structure of the Departments of Session" and made some changes to some of the department's responsibilities.

There are signs of spring everywhere; plants, birds, geese sitting on nests (ugh), fountains back in ponds, grass growing...so get outside and enjoy.

SOME HOOSIER TRIVIA

The people of Indiana have been called "Hoosiers" since at least the early 1800s. It is one of the oldest state nicknames and has a wider acceptance than most. Where did Hoosier come from? What is its origin? What we do know is that it came into general usage in the 1830s. John Finlay of Richmond wrote a poem, "The Hoosier's Nest", which was in the Indianapolis Journal, January 1, 1833. As soon as our nickname came into general use, speculation began as to its origin. Among the most popular theories:

- When a visitor hailed a pioneer's cabin in Indiana or knocked upon its door, the settler would respond, "Who's yere?", and from this frequent response, Indiana became the "Who's yere" or "Hoosier" state.
- 2. Indiana rivermen were so spectacularly successful in trouncing and "Hushing" their enemies in the brawling that was then common, that they came to be known as "Hushers" or Hoosiers.
- 3. There was once a contractor named Hoosier employed on the Louisville and Portland Canal, who preferred to hire laborers from Indiana. They were called, "Hoosiers".
- 4. A theory attributed to Governor Joseph Right, was that the word Hoosier derived from an Indian word for corn, "Hoosa". Indiana flatboat men, taking corn to New Orleans, came to be known as "Hoosa men", or Hoosiers. Unfortunately, for this theory, a search of Indian vocabularies by a careful student of linguistics failed to reveal any such Indiana word for corn.
- 5. James Whitcomb Riley offered another theory. He claimed that "Hoosier" originated from the pugnacious habits of our early settlers. They were enthusiastic and vicious fighters, who gouged, scraped and bit off noses and ears. This was so common that a settler coming into a tavern the morning after a fight and seeing ears on the floor, would say, "Whose ear?"

Easter Cupcakes

- 1 white cake mix
- ❖ 8oz cream cheese-softened
- ❖ 8oz lemon or key lime pie filling

4 eggs

❖ ¼ cup sugar




- In a small bowl, mix the softened cream cheese, 1 egg, pie filling and sugar. Set aside.
- Mix the cake mix according to the box directions suggest using coconut oil instead of vegetable oil.
- Fill your cupcake liners just over ½ full of cake batter, then with a regular kitchen sppon, put a big scoop of the cream cheese-pie filling batter on top.
- Bake at 325-350 degrees for abou t 20-25 minutes
