Now to the business of the church... The April 2023 Income and Expense Statement showed income of \$27,140.59 and expenses of \$19,362.89. I always like it when we take in more than we take out! The **Clerk** reported that Communion on June 4 will be prepared and served by Kathy Wood, Betty Gilliland, Anna Sosbe, and Marcia Justus. The Clerk has collected all the signed forms required by Presbytery for Conflict of Interest, Ethics, and Misconduct. A Committee will be formed to revise these forms and add an anti-racism and harassment policy required by the Presbytery.

Finance Committee reported that the playset for the playground will be delivered on Friday, May 26. The tentative date to put this equipment together is June 9. The safe in the office has been moved off the floor (thanks from all of us who don't get up from the floor as easily as we used to!).

Maintaining has purchased a new mower. Several restrooms were painted thanks to Deb Freedman of Head Start. Head Start graduation will be May 31 at 5:30 in Fellowship Hall. Maintaining is waiting for quote from Cade Masonry to fix the large crack in the concrete at the west entrance. Thanks to Karl Kreck for replacing black drain hoses on east side.

Nurturing is looking into new usher badges, communion candles (one leaks), and another Communion service. The cross will be taken down after Pentecost. During Communion the choir will be served before the elders. On Mondays at 7pm starting June 5 there will be a summer zoom Bible study based on the book <u>From Daughters to Disciples: Women's Stories from the New Testament.</u>

Mission and Outreach will continue to collect for The Refuge through June 11. We will be distributing water bottles at the Freedom Festival Parade. Our church will be on the September 23 historic tour of the city. Our pastor will be signing a letter on behalf of the congregation to support affordable and stable housing. Mission will also be sponsoring a letter writing campaign to appropriate members of the Indiana State Legislature requesting action to approve Housing Affordability and Stability in Indiana.

Member Care reported that Senior Somethings March meeting had 11 attending. Senior Somethings will continue on the 4th Wednesday. The Committee is looking at options for a "welcome gift" for visitors. Lauren is working on some "rack art" which we could pass out at events and put in pews with information about us.

New Business A reception is being planned for Judy Cook's 50th year of Ordination (May 20, 1973) for June 11 from 2-4 at University Heights Conv. Center. Mark your calendars. That's all from me for this month.

THELMA BEEM SCHOLARSHIP

Several years ago Thelma Beem left a portion of her estate to Greenwood Presbyterian Church with the restriction that it be used "for the children". Over the years this money has funded many church activities and projects for children and youth as well as support for the church's outreach to the children of the community. Despite several expenditures over the years, the fund has continued to grow and currently exceeds the original gift amount.

In May of 2021, the church established a scholarship program using money from the Thelma Beem Fund to provide assistance for young people from the church as they pursue post-secondary education. For complete guidelines, see Steve Baker, but as a summary:

- Must be under 21
- Maintain full-time status
- Maintain a minimum GPA of 2.0
- Parent or Guardian is a member of (or regularly attends) GPC
- Any post-secondary education (including vocational school or apprenticeship)
- Renewable up to 8 semesters (4 years)

Currently the scholarship is for \$2,000 per semester and the deadline to apply is June 30th. Applicants will be advised if approved for the scholarship and acceptance forms will be due July 31st. Funds will then be deposited into the student's account at their educational institution. If you know someone who may qualify for this scholarship, please see Steve Baker for an application.


CELEBRATING IUDY COOK


FEATHER IN YOUR CAP

ORIGINS OF FATHER'S DAY

In 1909, a couple named John and Sonora Dodd attended the Mother's Day service at their church in Spokane, Washington, USA.

As Sonora listened to the sermon, and heard the virtues of mothers and motherhood from the Bible, her mind went back to her childhood. She thought how important fathers are in raising children, and she thought of the notion of Father's Day. Sonora's father William, a Civil War veteran, lost his wife as she gave birth to a sixth child. Sonora was only sixteen at the time, the eldest,

and much of the role to raise her five brothers fell on her shoulders. Through the difficult years following her mother's death Sonora watched her father care for the six children with love and devotion and saw him makes sacrifices in order to give them all better lives.

After sitting through that Mother's Day service, Sonora felt inspired to campaign for equal recognition of fathers. So, in 1910 she approached the Spokane Ministerial Alliance and the Young Men's Christian Association (YMCA) to establish Father's Day as a holiday in the same fashion as Mother's Day. Due to the support of these organizations, and Sonora's dedication to the cause, the first Father's Day was celebrated on June 19, 1910.

Sonora's Father's Day concept started gaining attention when it was reported on in the June 6, 1910 edition of the *Spokane Chronicle*. The article quoted from Sonora's petition: "A Fathers' Day would call attention to such constructive teachings from the pulpit as would naturally point out;

- The father's place in the home
- The training of children
- The safeguarding of the marriage tie
- The protection of womanhood and childhood

"The meaning of this, whether in the light of religion or of patriotism, is so apparent as to need no argument in behalf of such a day."

Sonora was advocating for the day to be celebrated on the first Sunday in June, which was close to her father's birthday. However, that didn't allow pastors enough time to prepare for their services, so the first Father's Day was pushed back to the third Sunday in June. Local businesses that had already profited from the Mother's Day celebration started taking out newspaper ads with a Father's Day theme. Many trade groups that would benefit most, for example manufacturers of ties, belts and braces, helped Sonora to receive national coverage for Father's Day. The powerful New York Associated Menswear Retailers founded the Father's Day Council to help Sonora.

President Woodrow Wilson approved Father's Day in 1916, and then in 1919, when Sonora's father William Smart – the man who inspired the holiday – died, Father's Day had become a popular occasion celebrated across the United States of America.

In 1966 after forty years of Sonora campaigning and advertising for the holiday, President Lyndon Johnson signed a Presidential Proclamation that decided the third Sunday of June as Father's Day in the United States. It was in 1972 when real success was found as President Richard Nixon declared Father's Day as a 'permanent national observance.'

Sonora Dodd's efforts to celebrate and promote Fathers' Day were a practical expression of the Bible's mandate to 'Honor your Father and your Mother'.

2 eggs, well beaten

2 C. sugar

2 C. flour

1 tsp. vanilla

20 oz. can crushed pineapple in heavy

1 tsp. salt syrup 2 tsp. soda 2 C. chopped nuts

Mix well all ingredients well & pour into a greased & floured sheet cake pan. Bake at 350 degree about 25 min.
